

Quilted Denim Pet Cave & Mat – Tutorial

GUIDE TO CRAFTING THE US-STYLE QUILTED DENIM PET CAVE & MAT (METRIC EDITION)

Completed Project

1 Materials & Cutting
Cut A: Main Denim Panels (x2)
Cut B: Accent Pattern Panels (x2)
Cut C: Linings & Batting.

2 Sewing Pet Cave Sides (US Quilting Method)
Use a 1/4 inch seam allowance.
Quilt sandwich construction.
Small, neat topstitching.

3 Assembling the Cave Structure
Join quilted panels with right sides facing. Sew side seams. Turn right-side out.

4 Forming the Cave & Insertion
Sew base to side walls. Hand-stitch final seam for a clean finish. Cat is not included in this step!

5 Quilting the Mat
Create a cross-hatch or diamond quilt pattern. A walking foot is essential for even feeding. Bind edges.

6 Binding the Mat
Classic US method binding for durability and professional look. Hand-finish with invisible stitches.

This tutorial will guide you through creating a **US-style quilted denim pet cave with a matching quilted mat**. The project uses classic American quilting techniques such as **layered quilt sandwiches, 1/4 inch seam allowance, diamond quilting, and binding**.

By following these steps carefully, anyone with basic sewing skills and a sewing machine can complete this cozy pet shelter from start to finish.

The finished pet cave measures approximately:

- **Height:** 35 cm (13.7 in)
- **Depth:** 33.5 cm (13.2 in)
- **Entrance Width:** 29 cm (11.4 in)

The quilted mat measures approximately:

- **Width:** 36 cm (14.1 in)
- **Length:** 86 cm (33.8 in)

This project is ideal for cats or small dogs and creates a soft, durable sleeping space.

Step 1 – Materials and Fabric Preparation

Before starting, gather all materials and prepare your fabrics.

Fabrics

You will need three types of fabric layers:

Cut A – Main Denim Panels (2 pieces)

These pieces form the outer structure of the cave. Denim works well because it provides durability and structure.

Cut B – Accent Pattern Panels (2 pieces)

These decorative panels go in the center of the cave and give the project a quilted design style.

Cut C – Linings and Batting

You will need:

- Inner lining fabric
- Quilt batting (cotton or polyester)

Each quilted section will use a **three-layer sandwich**:

1. Outer fabric (denim or accent fabric)
2. Batting
3. Lining fabric

Tools

Prepare the following sewing tools:

- Sewing machine
- Fabric scissors or rotary cutter
- Cutting mat
- Measuring tape or quilting ruler
- Pins or fabric clips
- Chalk or fabric marking pen
- Iron
- Walking foot for quilting (recommended)

Important Sewing Standards Used

This project follows common US quilting practices:

- **1/4 inch seam allowance**
- **Topstitching for reinforcement**
- **Quilt sandwich construction**

Take time to iron your fabrics before cutting to ensure accurate measurements.

Step 2 – Cutting the Fabric Pieces

Now cut all pieces according to the shape shown in the guide.

You will create panels for:

- Two **side walls**
- One **base panel**
- Two **accent top panels**

Each panel requires **three layers**:

Outer fabric

Batting

Lining fabric

Stack each set like this:

Outer fabric facing **up**
Batting in the **middle**
Lining fabric facing **down**

This layered stack is called a **quilt sandwich**.

Secure the layers using pins or temporary spray adhesive so the layers do not shift while sewing.

Step 3 – Sewing the Pet Cave Panels (Quilt Sandwich Method)

With your fabric sandwiches prepared, you can begin sewing.

Start by stitching around the edges of each layered panel using a **1/4 inch seam allowance**. This keeps the layers stable.

Next, turn the stitched pieces **right side out** if you used the stitch-and-turn technique.

Carefully push out the edges and corners so the panels lie flat.

Press the pieces gently with an iron to smooth them.

To strengthen the panels and give them a professional look, sew **topstitching around the edges** about 1/8 inch from the edge.

This step also helps hold the batting in place.

Step 4 – Assembling the Cave Structure

Now it's time to build the triangular cave shape.

Place two quilted side panels **right sides facing each other**.

Pin the edges together carefully.

Sew the side seams using the **1/4 inch seam allowance**.

Once sewn, turn the structure **right side out** so the seams are hidden inside.

You will now see the cave shape starting to form.

Make sure the seams are smooth and aligned.

Press lightly with an iron if necessary.

Step 5 – Forming the Cave and Attaching the Base

Next you will attach the base panel.

Place the base piece along the bottom edges of the cave walls.

Pin the base securely to both side panels.

Slowly sew along the edges to attach the base to the walls.

Keep the seam allowance consistent and guide the fabric gently so the layers stay aligned.

After sewing, check that:

- The base lies flat
- The sides form a stable triangular tunnel

For a clean finish, hand stitch the final seam areas if necessary.

This step completes the **main cave structure**.

Note: The cat is **not included in this step** 🐱

Step 6 – Quilting the Matching Mat

Now you will create the coordinating quilted mat.

Prepare another **quilt sandwich** consisting of:

Top fabric
Batting
Backing fabric

Pin all layers securely.

Using your sewing machine with a **walking foot**, quilt the mat using a **cross-hatch or diamond pattern**.

To do this:

1. Draw diagonal lines across the fabric using chalk.
2. Sew along each line.
3. Turn the mat and sew diagonal lines in the opposite direction.

This creates the classic **diamond quilt pattern**.

The walking foot helps feed all layers evenly so the fabric does not shift.

Continue quilting until the entire mat surface has an even diamond pattern.

Step 7 – Binding the Mat Edges

The final step is finishing the edges using **traditional quilt binding**.

Cut binding strips from coordinating fabric.

Fold the strips lengthwise and press them.

Attach the binding to the edges of the mat using your sewing machine.

Sew the binding to the front side first.

Then fold it over the edge to the back side.

Hand stitch the binding to the back using **small invisible stitches**.

This method creates a durable and professional quilt finish.

Final Result

Once everything is complete, you will have:

- A **quilted denim pet cave**
- A **matching quilted comfort mat**

The cave provides a cozy, enclosed sleeping space, while the mat can be used inside the cave or separately.

Your finished project should look structured, padded, and durable thanks to the **quilting layers, topstitching, and classic binding techniques**.

Cats especially love these cave-style beds because they provide warmth, comfort, and a sense of security.
